## SCHOOL PROFILE

Located on the west side of Calgary with a clear view of the Rocky Mountains, Springbank Community High School stands out as one of the top academic high schools in Alberta with well rounded students prepared to thrive on the global stage. Our dual track school is home to approximately 750 grades 9 to 12 students drawn from Springbank, Bragg Creek and Redwood Meadows. Out of boundary students who meet the criteria for academic excellence are accepted where space permits.

Springbank offers an outstanding academic program with strong second language, fine arts and CTS programs. Coupled with a strong extracurricular program, high expectations, and excellent student support, Springbank is a school where students reach their potential.

## SCHOOL FACILITY

Springbank Community High School opened its doors in 1976 and in 1996 an addition and modernization was completed. Since then, six relocatable classrooms have been added.

Located next to Springbank High School is the Park for All Seasons with two arenas, a curling rink, an outdoor rink, football field, baseball and soccer fields.

In 2008/09 our multi purpose room (Room 150) was upgraded thanks
to a generous donation from the Calgary Airport Authority.

## STUDENT PROGRAMS AND SUCCESSES

Advanced Placement gives students the opportunity to take university level courses and exams while still in high school. Springbank offers AP English Literature and Composition, AP Calculus, AP Studio Art, and AP French Language.

- 33 students earned 4's or 5's on their AP exams in 08/09.


## Career and Technology Studies

- Multi Media -this program encourages students to use creative thinking and problem solving skills in photography, digital imaging, and audio/visual production.
- Students in Media Arts were short-listed for the Calgary Film Festival.
- Foods - students in grades 9 12 can take modules in food preparation.

Fine Arts- Fine Arts courses in Band, Art and Drama are offered.

- The Drama Club staged a production of "Footloose". Students also competed in the Provincial Drama competition and won first place.


## Second Languages

- French Immersion was introduced in grade 9 in 2006. In 2008/09 the French Immersion program celebrated it's first graduating class from grade 12. All French Immersion students wrote the French Language Advanced Placement exam.
- French as a Second Language French 9 through French 30 are offered. In 2008/09 the new French 30 program was offered.
- Spanish—Spanish 9, 10, 20, and 30 are offered at Springbank. Over 150 students per year take Spanish.
- Ninety French and Spanish program students travelled to France and Spain during Spring Break.


## Social Studies.

- 2008-2009 saw the new Grade

11 Social Students curriculum successfully implemented.

- On the Social Studies 30

Diploma exam one student earned $100 \%$.


The new Social Studies curriculum encourages the use of technology.

## Science

- Over the last three years new curriculum was successfully implemented for Biology, Chemistry and Physics.
- On the Physics 30 Diploma exam one student earned $100 \%$.
- At Springbank approximately $50 \%$ of students take all three sciences through Grade 12.
- Chemistry teacher, Audrey Chastko, is one of the authors of the text book, "Inquiry into Chemistry".


## Mathematics

- Beginning in 2009-2010 new curriculum will be phased in starting with grade 9 .
- In 2008-09 eight students earned $100 \%$ on the Grade 9 Provincial Achievement math test.
- One student earned $100 \%$ on the Math 30 Diploma exam. In AP Calculus 15 students earned 5's.
- Three students won recognition for their high achievement on the Cayley and Pascal Math Competition sponsored by the University of Waterloo.


## High Achieving Program

- Honours English—grade 10 and 11 honours English are offered. These courses feed into AP English 35.
- Course Acceleration-students in grades 10 and 11 who have achieved $85 \%$ or higher in a prerequisite course may take up to two courses at the next grade level.
- Gifted students received individualized program planning that includes four year planning for high school, workshop opportunities, and transition planning for post secondary.


## Resource Program:

- Individualized programming for Resource and Gifted students is provided within the regular program. Approximately 100 of our students are coded as Gifted.


## Grade 9

- Students in grade 9 Language Arts receive 250 hours of instruction (recommended 150) and in Mathematics they receive 250 hours (recommended 100).


## ATHLETIC PROGRAMS AND SUCCESSES

## Sports Teams

- Jr. and Sr. Varsity Volleyball, Cross-country, Track \& Field, Girls’ \& Boys' Soccer, Golf, Jr. and Sr. Varsity Basketball, Football, Rugby, and Badminton.
- In Girls' Golf, Springbank students won a gold medal at the Provincial level.
- In Track \& Field 15 students competed at Provincials and four medals were won.
- In Basketball The Senior Boys' won a silver medal at Zones and a silver medal at Provincials The Senior Girls' won gold at Zones and went on to win the AAA Provincial Championship.
- In Volleyball the Girls' Varsity team won Silver at Zones.
- In Soccer our girls' team won gold at Divisionals.

- $89 \%$ of Springbank Grade 9 students achieved "Acceptable" in the PAT's.
- $34 \%$ of Springbank Grade 9's received Excellence on their PAT's compared to $19 \%$ across the province.
- On Diploma exams 31\% achieved Excellence compared to $19 \%$ across the province.
- $84 \%$ of our students were eligible for Rutherford scholarships compared to $57 \%$ in the province. 90 Grade 12 students received Alexander Rutherford Scholarships totalling \$205,000.
- $88 \%$ of Springbank students complete high school in three years compared to the provincial average of 70.7\%
- 311 students earned Honour Roll in 2008/2009 ( $80 \%$ average and higher) which included 84 Grade 9 students, 98 Grade 10 students, 61 Grade 11 students, and 68 Grade 12 students.

52 students earned Honours with Distinction - $90 \%+$ in core subjects.
